WOULD He would do it if you wanted him to. I would like (infinitive). HE would say that, but SHE wouldn't. I'd rather live than die. WOULD² Would you be so kind as to offer me...? I would go if I could. I wish it would stop. 2. would prefer (infinitive)* Strong Word Stress = **Have Done** Would you mind showing me how to ...? If it would just stop raining, I could... I wouldn't want that. criticism of action/behaviour. 3. would prefer (noun TO noun)* You wouldn't mind if I sat here, would you? I'd prefer living to dying. I would say (if I had to) that ... I wouldn't have had it any other way. **Unspoken** condition is *see Social Interaction Table "if that person were there ." *I will prefer to do it. When I was a kid, I would usually hang out by the school **REPETITION & STATES** Past Tense Marker Required WOULD When I lived in San Jose, I would often see people doing that. = used to adverb, phrase, or clause IN THE PAST I used to eat there a lot, and I would always order the special CERTAINTY & INFERENCE **OBLIGATIONS & PROHIBITION** STRONG RECOMMENDATIONS CONCLUSION (Very Certain) EMPHATIC INVITATION MUST He must not have gotten my message You must be very careful. You mustn't forget your medication. You must be very careless. **MUST** You must try this cake! he always calls back. **Have Done** You must have a ticket to enter You must get some sleep! You must not be from around here. They must not have finished yet. You must call me! You mustn't do that here. Rare in America; "should" preferred. You must have the wrong number! the tools are still out. **SUGGESTIONS** MILD OBLIGATIONS **EXPECTATION (Certain) UNCERTAIN OFFERS IDIOMATIC IMPERATIVES** SHOULD You should try it. You shouldn't do that. Should you get lost, It should be there. SHOULD **Have Done** You should have called sooner. It should have been there Should I help you with that? You really should tell her. don't hesitate to call. Should 1? I should think so. He should have done it by now. You shouldn't worry so much. CONDITIONALS SUGGESTIONS (+TRY) **POSSIBILITY CONCLUSION (Less Probable) EMPHATIC OFFERS** MIGHT MIGHT If we drive all night, You might try asking her. It might rain; it might not. He might have been in an accident; **Have Done** Might I offer you some cake? You might have tried the other door. They might not have finished yet. we might actually get there on time. he's over an hour late. **POSSIBILITY** CONDITIONALS **CONCLUSION (More Probable) Prohibition & Permission Permission & Offers** MAY Might is Past Tense of May: thus. You may not do that. MAY If we drive all night, we may get there It may rain; it may not. He may have got stuck in traffic; **Have Done** In Written English Might is preferred over May You may help yourself on time, but probably not. He may not have finished yet. he's only five minutes late for Past Possibility May I be excused? May I help you? He may be American He maybe go there. **ERRORS** Mark Wunn MAYBE ADVERB NOT MODAL He maybe have done it.
