



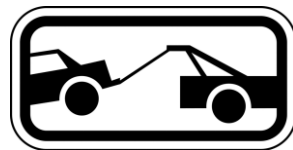
Write the tense for the verb tense under each clause. If it the sentence has two verb phrases, use the extra space to write the tense for both.

If he **does** not **finish soon**, I **could be** late to work.

Yes, my car **was worked on this summer** in Portland.

It **has** not **been worked on since then**.

My car **has already been being worked on for two hours now**.

I'm **going to have to be able to drive** to Portland **this Sunday**.



I **should** probably **think about** taking the bus.

Mechanics **work on** cars in shops.

The mechanic **is working on** my car **right now**.

The mechanic **has worked on** cars **since he was 12**.

The mechanic **will have fixed** his 1000th car **after fixing** 5 more cars.

My car **is** number 995.

If I **had** not **brought** my car in, the mechanic **might have fixed** his 1000th car
today.

The mechanic **has been working on** my car **for two hours**.

The mechanic says that he **could be working on**
my car **all afternoon**.

The mechanic **asks** me if my car **has been worked on before**.

He says the part they **used won't work** with the part he **is putting in**.

He says the car **will** not **be fixed today**.

He says my car **is working** but it **wouldn't be** safe on long drives.

My mechanic says that **would be** a good idea.
